

E.coli lawsuit to ‘batter’ Wrexham chippy

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Wrexham Council has told local press that it is preparing to take legal action following an August outbreak of E.coli in a town chip shop.

Four people were affected earlier this year, including a mother who fell into a five-week coma, after The Llay Fish Bar served contaminated food. The takeaway is now under new management but Wrexham Council has issued an inquiry “with a view to the institution of legal proceedings.”

Karen Morrisroe-Clutton, 32, was infected in July this year while her son was only 10 week’s old. During her longstanding coma, her husband Paul played audio tapes of their child in the hope it would reinvigorate her condition.

She told her husband she “wanted to die” during the ordeal, but after hearing the voice of her son she decided: “I need to live” and has made a full recovery from the infection.

A statement from Toni Slater, Public Protection Service Manager for Wrexham Council, said: “A file is currently being prepared with a view to the institution of legal proceedings following the out-break and inspection of the premises.”
